Public-protection guide

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How the NBPAC protects the public, and how you can help.

Confirm that someone is a member

Before engaging a criminologist's services, you can confirm they are a member in good standing of the NBPAC using the member directory.

File a complaint

Anyone may file a complaint about a member's professional conduct. The process is confidential and fair.

1. Prepare a written description of the facts, dates and people involved.
2. Submit the form or write to the secretariat.
3. The secretariat acknowledges receipt within 10 business days.
4. The ethics committee assesses admissibility within 30 days.
5. A reasoned decision is communicated; an appeal is possible.

Report false membership

The "criminologist" title is not yet protected by law in New Brunswick; the NBPAC is working toward its recognition. You can, however, report a person who falsely presents themselves as an NBPAC member or uses the Association's name without authorization.

Disciplinary decisions

In the interest of transparency, disciplinary decisions issued against members are published by the Association. No decisions have been issued to date.
